Police chopper slated for Coast

THE State Government has announced plans to provide police with funding to establish a Polair helicopter capability for the Sunshine Coast and Wide Bay.

Queensland Police Service will now embark on a procurement process to secure an appropriate aircraft and operator. Timing will be announced following its procurement.

The decision follows advice from Queensland Police and advocacy from Sunshine Coast and Wide Bay MPs.

Polair operational capabilities have proved extraordinarily successful in South-East Queensland and in Townsville. Member for Nicklin Rob Skelton said a Polair

helicopter capability would make a very real difference to police's ground operations. "It makes challenging police operations

safer for the community and safer for the police on the ground," he said. "Over the past few months, I have been

hearing from locals all across our region about their concerns regarding crime. "Whilst reassuringly, the Sunshine Coast's

crime rates are among the lowest in Queensland, I know that it only takes one incident of crime to have a deep, irreversible impact on people and families.

"We've seen very promising results come out of our gold standard early intervention programs, but I want to see more.""

Commissioner of Police Steve Gollschewski said the chopper would help keep the community and police safe.

"Aerial assets are a game-changer in the way police track offenders, search for missing people and gain extensive situational awareness from above.

"Bolstering resources for police will help our frontline now and into the future as the organisation continues to grow."

Nambour pilot's WW2 heroism

A huge crowd at Nambour's ANZAC Day ceremony heard the story of a fledgling pilot from Nambour whose brave actions saved an English town in WWII.

Nicklin MP Rob Skelton told the crowd of the heroic act of RAAF pilot James (Jim) Hocking.

"I would like to recognise the 80th anniversary of the heroic actions of the RAAF pilot James Jim Hocking," Mr Skelton said.

James Jim Hocking," Mr Skelton said.

"Like many of his generation and those before and after Jim enlisted in the military the day he turned 18 and was accepted into the RAAF in September, 1942.

"He was later transferred to England to train for bomber command. On July 18th, 1944, Jim was captaining a Short Sterling bomber LJ 451 during night training when flames appeared on the inner starboard engine.

Soon the plane lost power

"Soon the plane lost power with engine two cutting out and the other two engines following soon after. Jim ordered his crew of six to don their parachutes and abandon the aircraft.

"Jim stayed behind telling his crew mates he would be following them. He wanted to ensure the plane didn't crash into the town below.

"Jim was last seen manoeuvring the bomber away from the town of March before it crashed into a field, a kilometre from the town. A young man barely 21 years old. Jim Hocking represents what we call the ANZAC spirit, a hero who sacrificed himself for his mates and

the English town of March, below.

"In 2015, Jim was recognised for his bravery posthumously with the Star of Courage some 71 years later.

"He is one of us. I would like to thank the schools of our region and Nambour Museum for preserving and remembering his story. Jim's story is a thread in the vast tapestry that is our nation's story.

"The story about our ANZAC spirit. It reminds us of what it means to be an Australian or New Zealander. I thank everyone here today for their contributions to this history and respectful commemoration. Jim was one of us and he is all of us. We remember him. We remember all of them in our hearts forevermore. Lest we forget."





Heroic digger's remarkable story of WWI survival

E was gassed. He was blown up. He fought in the bloody battles of Pozieres and Villers Bretonneux.

And on ANZAC Day, 2024, his grandson, Lieutenant Colonel Ian Stoddart, retired veteran of the Royal Australian Engineers, delivered a solemn address in his memory.

The former Nambour High School (Nambour State College) student recounted a poignant tale from his family history. He told the service about his grandfather, Tom, and the enduring legacy of the ANZAC spirit. The tribute provided a stirring reminder of the sacrifices made by those who served their nation during conflict.

Lt Col Stoddart said Tom wasn't born in Australia but moved out with his family in the early 1900s as a young lad.

"He had a job with the Adelaide Steamship Company as a shipping clerk. He was six foot tall, athletic, and when the war came up, Tom was an early enlistee. He was posted as a stretcher bearer to the First Army General Hospital. Prior to deployment his girlfriend at the time said she'd wait for him. He was on the first troop ship out with a number of others and they got to Egypt where they all trained.

"Tom didn't go to Gallipoli. The hospital remained in Egypt and his job was to carry the wounded down from the ships. After Gallipoli, they went to France.

"And due to the amount of people that were wounded and killed, he transferred across to the infantry into the 12th Battalion. In July, 1916, the day before his battalion was to march down to the Somme, he wrote his mother a letter.

"In that letter he said that he believed that the cause was just, and that he was there to fight a war to end all Wars. Just an aside, both his sons and his grandson have subsequently been to war, so off he marched to the Somme, to the Battle of Pozières (23 July – 3 September 1916) "In the six weeks of that battle, there were more casualties than the eight months of Gallipoli. The Australian divisions suffered 23,000 casualties, of which 6800 of them died or died of wounds. Tom's Battalion was only in the battle for eight days. Of a unit of around 700, they had 446 casualties. Tom was one of those.

"He was blown up by an artillery shell. He

was evacuated out and sent back to the UK to recover. After a time getting over his injuries, he came back to France, back into the same battalion. He rose to the rank of Corporal. He was then awarded a battlefield commission.

He was just the best of what was left.

"He was promoted Second Lieutenant and awarded the Meritorious Service Medal. Now, there was no more training. He was just the best of what was left. He continued on, got gassed, injured again.

"So again, he came back from the front lines, went back into another unit – the 51st battalion and fought at the Battle of Villers-Bretonneux. From there, he saw the end of the war. But that

for Tom wasn't the end of it. He was a good administrator and probably because he was a shipping clerk in civilian life, he was posted to the admin headquarters and he was responsible for the repatriation of all the soldiers and airmen back to Australia.

"He didn't come home until 1920, nearly two years after the war, as a Captain. Now Tom's character epitomised what is now known as the spirit of the ANZACs. He was cheeky. He was certainly a bit of a rascal, but he was loyal, he was brave, and he was a good mate.

"Above my medals, I wear two RSL badges, one's mine and the other's Tom's. Tom was one of my heroes. He was also my grandfather. Thank you."



Honouring Montville's fallen:

Moving Dawn Service remembers six local sons lost to World War II

ANZAC Day Address by Montville History Group's Cate Patterson at the Montville Dawn Service

EVERY ANZAC Day, we honour all who have served in our name, and all who continue to serve today.

Previous ANZAC Dawn Services have acknowledged the sacrifice and service of Montville fallen from WW1 with only a couple of names known from WW2. 67 men and 13 women are named on the WW2 honour board with another 28 also connected with the district. Of these six were killed. Today we remember them and pay tribute to their young lives – given in service to their nation.

Hilary York Seccombe Brown

Hilary York Seccombe Brown was the youngest son of George and Ruth Brown, a much-respected early farming family. George was a lay preacher and later a Church Warden at St Mary's Church. Hilary was a true son of Montville. He was born at the family home *Craglands*, went to school at Montville and attended St Mary's Church. After he left school he worked with his father as a fruit grower and joined the Militia at 18 when war was first announced.

Hilary was 19 when he enlisted in 1940 and served the next year in the Middle East. Home on leave in May 1942 the newspaper story told of narrow escapes, a bullet piercing his tin hat and grazing his hair, another bullet striking his haversack and grazing his shoulder.

Just a few months later Hilary Brown sailed for Port Moresby. While at Townsville on shore leave, Hilary was a guest of family friends for dinner. He called home to Montville, and wrote his mother a letter. It would be the last time his family would hear from him.

Appointed Acting Lance Sergeant, Hilary went into action with the Australian troops fighting the Japanese along the Kokoda Track. He was ordered to take his section to locate another. He accomplished this. Then with daylight fading, Hilary set off alone back through the jungle to report their location.

Hilary on his own, was ambushed and attacked by snipers. His body was found by his men the next day.

Driver Lloyd George (Joe)

Young Joe Foster was working at Montville as a truck driver who did running repairs. He was on the Montville footy team and all of 21 when he enlisted.

Joe and his mate, Allen Harvey, were the first two volunteers from the Montville District for active service and were farewelled together.

They were drivers for the 2/3rd Field Ambulance, and after training were members of the 6th Division.

Joe went to England where he was injured in an air raid in London when a shell struck a shelter, and he was hit in the knees and face with shrapnel. He was later sent to Palestine and then Egypt. Joe was part of the Siege of Tobruk. Only days before the Australian troops were due to be relieved Joe died in a vehicle collision.

Private Leonard James Harvey

Private Len Harvey, like Hilary Brown, was born in Montville, went to school here and worked as a farmhand. His Harvey and Butt grandparents were highly respected early settlers as were his parents James and Daisy Harvey. Len was 19 when he enlisted in 1942. He completed jungle training at Canungra 80km south of Brisbane. The following year he qualified in

Infantry Signals. From September 1943 Len served in New Guinea with 2/6 Australian Infantry Battalion.

On leave in December 1944 Len married his 19-year-old sweetheart Joyce Frizzell, and then re-joined his unit at Aitape, New Guinea.

The Aitape – Wewak Campaign was the last Australian campaign in New Guinea. Just two months before the end of the war, Private Leonard Harvey was killed in action. He knew of the birth of his baby son Brian Leonard Harvey on 15 April 1945 and sent telegrams to Joyce rejoicing in his little boy.

Private Richard Leslie Charles Lippett

Private Dick Lippett was a

Londoner who immigrated as a 14-year-old with his older sister. Dick was a farm labourer at Montville. He was a keen sportsman and played football for Montville and was captain of the Montville Cricket Club.

Private Lippett was assigned to the 2/15th Infantry Battalion. He left Australia for training and duties in England before heading to Libya, seeing action at the Siege of Tobruk.

He became seriously ill and died from typhoid fever on 28 August 1941.

Ordinary Seaman Jim Berry 260

Ordinary Seaman Jim Berry's family had immigrated from Manchester, England to become Mont-

ville farmers.

Jim joined the Militia when he was 17 and enlisted in the Royal Australian Navy when he was 18.

He trained at HMAS Brisbane until August 1941. After further training at HMAS Cerberus and HMAS Penguin he served aboard the British depot ship HMS Anking based off Java.

Following the fall of Singapore in February 1942, all British craft were ordered to leave Jakarta.

On 4 March 1942, HMS Anking was attacked by a Japanese heavy cruiser squadron off the south coast of Java.

Jim's ship was sunk and he was not among the survivors. Ordinary Seaman Jim Berry, was just 19 years old

Gunner Herbert Steinhardt 295

Gunner Herb Steinhardt's family were Hunchy farmers and Herb went to Palmwoods State School.

He played cricket for both Palmwoods and Montville and was a keen tennis player. He became a member of the 2/14th Light Horse and then enlisted in the 2nd AIF with his brother Hal and joined 2/2 Anti-Tank Regiment as a gunner.

Regiment as a gunner.

This regiment was deployed in North Africa to undertake the defence of Egypt before taking part in the Syria and Lebanon Campaigns against the Vichy French who controlled these French Protectorates.


Herb was killed in action in Syria aged just 24 years on 10 July 1941. He is buried at the Damascus Commonwealth War Cemetery.

For these six men

For these six men – a sniper attack, a vehicle collision, illness, bombing and combat cruelly ended their young lives along with so many others who stepped up for us.

We stand here and await the dawn together in the hope that one day all wars will end, and peace will prevail.



Club's tribute to fallen teammate

NEARLY a year on from the accident that ended his life a young rugby league player has been honoured by his beloved footy club family.

Nambour Junior Rugby League Club on Wednesday (April 24) unveiled a memorial garden and bench in memory of the popular young man. Ben would have celebrated his 17th birthday this week.

Juniors President Leith Hensley said Ben's teammates from the under 17 side, along with their parents, came down to join in putting the garden together.

"It was a special afternoon seeing many of his mates getting together for him once again and contributing to what will be a very special and significant place at Nambour Rugby League Club.

"This will be somewhere that people can come to share laughs or shed some tears. To maybe take some time out if they need a moment to themselves or with Ben."

The garden setting includes a lychee tree. BJ worked on a lychee farm in between his school and football commitments.

"It will be somewhere that we can continue to remember Ben and all the times we had with him under the shade of the lychee tree," said Leith.

Plaques honouring Ben have also been hung in the dressing sheds. "Ben is always going to be remembered in Nambour Junior Rugby League with little reminders in the dressing sheds of what he brought to the field. And also a player award named in his honour," said

The plaques include the following wording as a reminder of Ben's attributes and as a touch-point for players as they take the field:



"Forever missed, forever remembered. Always a Crusher. Run it straight. Tackle with purpose."

Leith said the garden was a place to sit down and reflect on the impact Ben had on those who knew him. "Or it can be just a quiet place for anyone to go and sit down, take some time to themselves or share a moment with a friend.

"This remarkable project will give not only Benny's teammates, friends and family, somewhere significant to always come and enjoy his memory, but all members of our club now and beyond for many years to come. A place to remember a young man who left a lasting impression on everyone who knew him.'

With that, Leith looked to the sky. "Hope you're running it straight up there, Benny. The whole club is still running it straight for you mate."

'Every day is hard'

Leith then asked Ben's parents to cut the ribbon. Ben's dad Chris Hunter said every day was difficult.

"Yes, it is hard for everyone and us, but what's gone into this is fantastic. Just keep it up, use it. Talk to him. Because he's here. So, thank you all."

Nambour Men's Shed President Bob Ward said the club was pleased to be involved. "It was our honour to do this work," he said. "We put a lot of extra effort into it. It's something that has to stand the test of time."

Benjamin Hunter, 16, also known as BJ and Ben, died from critical head and chest injuries after he was hit on Image Flat Road near Nambour, on June 25 last year.

The bench plaque inscription reads: "Because Someone We Love Is in Heaven; There's a Little Bit of Heaven in Our Fields.'

How to manage the symptoms of Carpal Tunnel Syndrome

Wellness with Linda Goggan, Sacred Body Montville

WITH the increase of time spent working on computers, Carpal Tunnel Syndrome (CTS) is becoming more common among Australians.

Recent studies have shown that the condition once predominantly found in women has now seen a significant increase in men. It was once thought that was predominant in women as pregnancy was found to be one of the common causes. But we are now seeing an increase in men due to the ageing population as there are strong links between arthritis and carpal tunnel.

What is CTS?

This is the inflammation and /or entrapment of the nerves that run through the carpal tunnel in the anterior of the wrist, resulting in pain, numbness and /or weakness in the affected wrist.

What causes CTS?

The most common cause is the repetitive use or motion of the wrist (e.g. computer use), for long periods. It is considered an over use or repetitive strain injury with excessive flexion and extension.

We don't often consider the way that we hold our hands, wrists and forearms while we are performing an activity. The wrists are fundamental and foundational to the use of the hands, which offer us the ability to carry out



the intricate details of our everyday life. The health and intimate connection with our wrists sets forth the full expression of all that we do with our hands.

How to treat CTS?

The stage the condition is at determines the treatment. Stages 1 and 2 range from occasional intermittent pain to more regular severs throughout the day and may simply require rest, splinting and massage treatments.

Stage 3 is constant pain, and reduction in mobility, and a more surgical approach may be required.

Ways to prevent or reduce reoccurrence of CTS:

- Be gentle and present when carrying out tasks. Be more mindful about positioning and weight on wrists.
 - Give yourself a break during tasks
 - Stretches
- Avoid frequently overextending and flexing of wrists.
- Get regular arm and hand massages. For more support about how to prevent and treat Carpal Tunnel Syndrome contact your health professional.

Masterstroke: Maleny completes iconic first hole rebuild

MEMBERS and visitors alike have been rejoicing since Maleny Golf Club finished rebuilding the treacherous green on its picturesque opening hole which had a fearsome reputation for ruining otherwise good rounds.

Arguably one of the most iconic holes on the Coast, the remodelled 1st, will be a signature hole at Maleny and a spectacular introduction to a unique golfing experience.

Prior to reconstruction, the 117m Par 3 hole was the second toughest at Maleny due to a fierce back-to-front slope of around four per cent - causing well placed tee shots to roll off the green and down over a one-metre-high, dry-rock wall.

Even former US Masters Champion and PGA tour pro Adam Scott carded a double bogie when he first attacked the hole with a wedge after it opened for play in February 2020.

General Manager Stephen Porter said golf should be about rewarding good shots, but there was rarely any reward on this hole.

So last year the Board decided to literally "level the playing field" by creating a back-up 19th hole and rebuilding the green on the 1st Hole to reduce the fall to about one per cent.

The final combined cost of the two new holes was around \$60,000. Mr Porter said course Superintendent Mick McCombe and his team deserved high praise as the work.

Ticket sales data revealed that 84 percent of attendees were from outside Nambour, highlighting the event's ability to draw people to town.







How to make your own butter

Hinterland Homesteading Column

■HERE are lots of aspects about Homesteading which are really satisfying, but the one to top it all is homemade butter. I like it because instead of eating a margarine product which they say is one molecule away from being plastic, we can quite simply make our own butter and we know what it contains. It can be another food at your place that you

How to make butter

It is just so easy to do! Butter is made of milk or cream, whichever you use it needs to be full fat. Ideally it would be wonderful to live down the street from a dairy, but let's face it, not many people do. Don't be put off though, you can still make terrific butter at home from grocery store cream. I buy the full fat cream from the grocery store, and it makes lovely butter every time.

Gone are the days of the butter churns which were manual kitchen instruments. Just pull out your food processor, pour your cream in there and put it on a medium setting for a few minutes. You might like to add a sprinkle of salt or maybe try your first batch without salt. Then you will get a feel for what it tastes like.

At first not much will seem to happen, but as it thickens you will notice the cream will turn from white to a yellow and the buttermilk will separate. You will know when this is happening as it will look like lumps of cottage cheese. Keep the food processor going a little longer.

When it is thick, lift the butter out and strain it through a clean cotton cloth, new chux or simply squeeze it with your hands. What you want to do is squeeze the buttermilk in to a bowl. Once you have the butter, pop it into the fridge for 10 mins to chill it.

Once chilled you can shape it with your butter paddles, or 2 spatulas from the second drawer! A 600ml cream will make almost 250-300g of butter. If you don't have a food processor or are just wanting to share a fun time with the kids. You can pour the cream into a jar and pop a clean marble inside. Take turns in shaking the jar continuously and the same process will happen as above. The cream will separate and turn into butter. This is a great exercise to show children how to make homemade butter. They will love the hands on

What to do with the buttermilk which is left over? It isn't actually traditional buttermilk as such, as buttermilk needs lactic acid to give

it the tangy taste, which in times gone by it would have been allowed to start to sour before use to get that taste. What you have can be used in recipes though. You can easily look up some recipes for pancakes, scones etc to use

it up or give your doggie a treat.

More economical?

Making butter yourself it not really a cost saving exercise, I think it works out about the same when you factor in buying the cream, power, your time etc. It is more for the benefit of knowing what is in your food and expanding on our understanding of the source of our food, the processes and eliminating nasties. Homemade butter is creamier, fluffier and tastes delicious!

Homemade butter will last for 2-3 weeks. It can be stored on the kitchen bench in the cooler months here in South East Queensland, but in the warmer months it needs to go in the fridge. You can also freeze your homemade butter for about 9 months.

If you were fortunate enough to source a lot of milk or cream, you could have a big butter making session and store it for later.

Give making your own butter a go – it is a fun process and simply tastes just that - simple, no other nasties added.
